UNPARALLELED SPORTING SUCCESS



YEAR 8,9 AND 10 P AND Q BANDS NEXT SCHOOL YEAR GARY TOWERS, DEPUTY HEADTEACHER

Year 8

As pupils move into Year 8 and so are more familiar with the school, they mixed with others from across the year group for their teaching classes. In order to do this, pupils are placed randomly on the P or Q half of the year. This placement is checked by the Heads of House and the individual learning department to make sure it is appropriate. This means pupils will not be in their tutor groups for lessons. We do this to allow pupils to develop their social skills (working and interacting with new people) in a controlled classroom environment. Pupils remain in their tutor groups for tutor time and personal development lessons.

Year 9

Pupils in Year 9 are mixed with others from across the year group for their teaching classes. In order to do this, pupils are placed randomly on the P or Q half of the year. This placement is checked by the Heads of House and the individual learning department to make sure it is appropriate. The band they are in this year may be different from last year and this mixing is intentional.

This is to allow pupils to develop their social skills (working and interacting with new people) in a controlled classroom environment. Pupils remain in their tutor groups for tutor time and personal development lessons.

Year 10

For option subjects pupils will be taught in classes made up of pupils from across the Year group based on the options they have selected.

In core subjects pupils will be mixed with others from the same band they are in (P or Q). Pupils are placed randomly on the P or Q half of the year. This placement is checked by the Heads of House and the individual learning department to make sure it is appropriate. The band they are in this year may be different from last year and this mixing is intentional. This is to allow pupils to develop their social skills (working and interacting with new people) in a controlled classroom environment. Pupils remain in their tutor groups for tutor time and personal development lessons.

We would encourage parents to talk about this with their children over the summer. For most pupils the opportunity to work with a new group of people is exciting but some can be a little nervous.

SEPTEMBER 2023 – UNIFORM NEIL BAXTER, DEPUTY HEADTEACHER

The summer is a great time to review pupils' unforms and make sure all pupils are looking smart, ready for September.

From 1st September 2023, girls in Year 7, Year 8 and Year 9 will be required to wear the checked skirt.

Girls in Year 10 and Year 11 may still choose the grey skirt, but please check these are a good fit and not altered in any way. All skirts should be kneelength, and if you daughter has grown since the skirt was purchased, the summer would be a good time to buy a new skirt.

Pupils will be back in "winter uniform" from September, so that means shirts tucked in, ties on smartly and top buttons done up. If your child's shirt is getting tight around the collar and the top button is hard to do up, the summer would be a good time to buy some new shirts.

Some shops (Clarks, JD Sports and others) are putting shoes in their "School Shoes" section that do NOT meet the requirements for Balcarras. Please check with your House Head if in doubt. Black trainer-like shoes are not permitted at Balcarras.

Make-up, jewellery and piercings

This is a brief reminder to parents about the rules at Balcarras regarding make-up, hair and piercings. From the school's behaviour policy:

Hair	Hair should not be dyed. It should be smart, tidy and appropriate for school. There should be no braids and extreme hairstyles are not allowed. Hair should not have "tram lines", extreme changes in length or be shaved shorter than a number 2.
Make-up	Make up, nail varnish and false nails should not be worn by any student. False eye lashes or eye lash extensions are NOT permitted.
Pierced ears	Students with pierced ears are permitted to wear one small stud in the lower lobe of each ear. No sleepers.
Jewellery	One watch with a plain strap maybe worn. No other jewellery is permitted. NOTE: The following are not permitted. Any facial piercings, including nose studs. Stretch earrings or pins. Bangles, beaded, plastic or loom band bracelets. Festival or charity wrist bands. Any type of rings, bracelets or necklaces.

If, during the summer holidays, your child is having their hair dyed or their ear pierced at the top, please make sure that it is all returned to normal, and any piercings removed by the start of September.


